FREE SAT PRACTICE TEST FOR NEW ONLINE FORMAT - In the 2023-2024 school year, College Board is moving all SAT and PSAT exams to an online format. To help students prepare for this transition, Bowie is partnering with Revolution Prep to administer a free online practice SAT from 11:00-3:00 on Saturday, April 1. Students will take the test remotely at home. This opportunity is geared toward juniors but is also open to sophomores. There is no cost for the exam, but students must register for it in advance. STUDENT VAPING PROBLEM - According to a 2022 CDC survey, about 14 percent of high school students report using vapes (aka e-cigarettes). With flavored varieties, teen-focused marketing, and easy access from online vendors and local retail operators, vaping appeals to many young people. Unlike cigarettes and marijuana, which have distinct smells that are easier to identify, vaping is more difficult to associate with a scent because products are available in a wide range of flavors, including ones that are unscented. Moreover, e-cigarettes are easily concealed, and the "vapor" exhaled by the user quickly dissipates. These combined traits make it extremely difficult to detect and interrupt the use of e-cigarettes by students.

Bowie is not immune from the teen e-cigarette trend and is struggling to manage the issue. Clandestine vaping sessions in the restrooms mean that plumbers and custodians routinely pull 4-5 vape pens at a time out of clogged toilets, teachers are frequently frustrated by student attempts to leave class to vape, and other students are inconvenienced, intimidated, or avoid using the restroom altogether. Additionally, Bowie's five assistant principals are spending an inordinate amount of time monitoring Bowie's twenty-two restrooms, watching security camera footage to investigate reports of e-cigarette use, and processing multiple vape-related disciplinary actions every single day. Of greater concern is that of student health and safety, particularly because of the number of vape pens seized that contain THC, the psychoactive component of marijuana. These pens are potentially being shared with or sold to other students, some of whom may not even be fully aware of what they are consuming. We are also

concerned for the health of those students who do not use e-cigarettes but may be exposed to the exhaled chemicals of others. The danger of e-cigarettes to students exceeds what experimentation with smoking may have posed to their parents, as evidenced by recent incidents of students using vapes and then experiencing serious adverse reactions that required medical attention.

Here's what you can do to protect your child and to support Bowie's efforts to address this persistent campus problem:

- 1. Take time to talk to your child about the health dangers of vaping. The CDC's <u>Tip Sheet for Parents</u> offers suggestions for how to manage these conversations. Warn your child about the dangers and consequences of taking or trying something another student may offer them at school.
- 2. Review the <u>disciplinary consequences</u> for using e-cigarettes at school. Vaping can result in the student's assignment to in-school suspension (ISS) or a placement at <u>Austin ISD's Alternative Learning Centering</u> (ALC) before the student can return to classes at Bowie. Those in possession of THC devices or cartridges also face arrest on felony criminal charges, with those 17 and older to be processed as adults.
- 3. Ensure that your child does not have access to e-cigarettes. Secure any e-cigarettes that you may have in your household and be open to the possibility that your child may have e-cigarettes on their person, among their possessions, and/or in their vehicle.
